PROPOSED: Conversion of barn into 2 dwellings, creation of curtilages and installation of new package treatment plant. Windy Hills Farm, Chipping (3/2012/0639)

A barn of a slightly smaller footprint than that proposed for conversion is depicted on the 1st Edition Ordnance Survey 1:10560 (Lancashire Sheet 46), surveyed 1844, although the presence of quoins on the current building, indicative of a possible late 18th century date, might suggest they are one and the same building. Consequently the building should therefore be considered to be of some historical interest, dating probably to the early years of the 19th century, but having undergone a number of alterations in response to changes in agricultural practices and economics. The period 1750-1880 has been recognised as the most important period of farm building development in England.

The proposed conversion will have a significant impact on the historic character and appearance of the building, and may result in the loss of some historic fabric. The CBAs '*An Archaeological Research Framework for North West England: Volume 2, Research Agenda and Strategy*' has indicated that "there is an urgent need for all local authorities to ensure that farm buildings undergoing adaptation are at least considered for recording" (p. 140) so that "a regional database of farm buildings can be derived and variations across the region examined." (ibid.).

Consequently should the Local Planning Authority be minded to grant planning permission to this or any other scheme, the Lancashire Archaeology Service would recommend that the recording of the buildings prior to conversion be secured by means of the following condition:

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CR

Condition: No works shall take place on the site until the applicant, or their agent or successors in title, has secured the implementation of a programme of building recording and analysis. This must be carried out in accordance with a written scheme of investigation, which shall first have been submitted to and agreed in writing by the Local Planning Authority.

Reason: To ensure and safeguard the recording and inspection of matters of archaeological/historical importance associated with the building.

This is in accordance with government guidance as set out in the National Planning Policy Framework, para. 141 "Local planning authorities should... require developers to record and advance understanding of the significance of any heritage assets to be lost (wholly or in part) in a manner proportionate to their importance and the impact, and to make this evidence (and any archive generated) publicly accessible".


