

Heritage Statement

Hurst Green is a small village located in the Ribble Valley district of Lancashire, England. The village has a long and interesting history, and its location has made it significant in a number of ways.

45 Avenue Road, BB79QB is currently and always been a residential property, built in 1826 for then a thriving cotton industry. A row of 10 cottages were built to house cotton workers. To the rear is an entrance to the cellar which was used as a workshop at this time. After further investigation this property was found to have no significant historical heritage.

The full row of cottages have since seen various upgrades. Including Double Glazing, extensions, conservatories and modern heating systems. Further more it has been observed that a number of properties in the area already have Solar Pv installations. I have put pictures in Dropbox for these.

Below is a brief history of the town

One of the most notable events in Hurst Green's history occurred in 1513, when the Battle of Flodden was fought nearby. This was a significant battle between the English and the Scottish, and it resulted in a decisive victory for the English. Following the battle, many of the wounded soldiers were brought to Hurst Green for treatment, and it is said that the local pub, the Shireburn Arms, was used as a field hospital.
