Identification of Tree(s) and Description of Works

Please identify the tree(s) and provide a full and clear specification of the works you want to carry out

1. Some 15 years ago a central cable bracing system was installed after the Junior school complained and we had meetings with the Head teacher governors and Parents regarding the risk if branch failure occurred and something fell into the School play area. Some trees were pruned and in the case of 620 the bracing system was installed to minimise the risk of harm. The cable bracing may well have served to reduce the severity of the recent failures
2. The tree has suffered from bleeding canker for several years and only 60% of the butt circumference is bark covered. I would expect the tree to have a degree of central decay but hammer and drill tests suggest that catastrophic failure is unlikely. The yellowing of the leaf canopy suggests that the trees capability to transfer moisture and to photosynthesise is being compromised a cycle of decline may be starting.
3. The Horse chestnut to the north of 620 suffered a large limb failure in the recent past and was felled. This open space will have increased the wind effect on 620 so that when gusting winds occurred a few weeks ago the canopy had less protection and the 300mm dia branch failed into the churchyard. Photos of the failed union suggest that timber decay was not the cause.
4. The highest value targets close to the tree are the children sometimes in the school play area and the Public right of way to the west. The west facing canopy has been reduced several times and the children's play area has a 7m exclusion zone on the churchyard side.
5. As the tree canopy is now more exposed to the prevailing winds, branch failure has occurred twice within the last two years and we seem to have greater likelihood of gusting winds in the future I feel that removal of 620 would be wise. The canopy could be dramatically reduce to 12m from 18m but Horse Chestnuts do not respond well to topping and such a pruning regime would look brutal within a Conservation Area. If the tree was fully removed to ground level there would be a 24m gap which could be filled with three select standard oaks able to fill the space over the next 50-100 years during which two further Chestnuts may need removal.
6. I recommend the felling and removal of the Tree 620 and replacement planting of three select standard oaks at 6m centres 1m clear of the Footpath Wall.
