With regard to your consultation letter dated 13 October 2025, I have the following comments to make based on all the information provided by the applicant to date.

Summary

No objection subject to conditions

Lancashire County Council acting as the Local Highway Authority does not raise an objection regarding the proposed development and are of the opinion that the proposed development will not have a significant impact on highway safety, capacity or amenity in the immediate vicinity of the site subject to the following conditions being stated on any approval.

Advice to Local Planning Authority

Introduction

The Local Highway Authority (LHA) are in receipt of an application for the proposed demolition of existing dwelling house and conversion of attached barn to create replacement dwelling house (self build) with single storey extension on original footprint at Fells Farm, Wigglesworth Road, Slaidburn.

Site Access

The site will be accessed via an existing access onto a private access track which meets the adopted highway at Wigglesworth Road which is classified as the B6478, with a speed limit of 60 mph fronting the site access.

Internal Layout

The LHA have reviewed drawing number 07 Rev B titled Proposed Site Plan and is aware that the dwelling complies with the LHAs parking standards as defined in the Joint Lancashire Structure Plan. Vehicles can also turn within the site, enabling ingress and egress in a forward gear.

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Public Right of Way

Please note that there are Public Rights of Way's, FP0317018, through the application site which must not be obstructed during the proposed developments. The granting of planning permission does not constitute the diversion of a Definitive Right of Way. The applicant should be advised to contact Lancashire County Council's Public Rights of Way section by email on PROW@lancashire.gov.uk, quoting the location, district and planning application number, to discuss their proposal and the suggested diversion before any development works begin.

The applicant must be certain that they have private vehicular rights along this public path before driving on it either during construction or for subsequent access. Without private vehicular rights or permission from the owner it is a criminal offence to drive a motor vehicle on the public path.

Sustainability

The site shall increase its sustainable transport options to encourage and promote sustainable transport use. Therefore, the development shall include covered secure cycle storage shall be provided for two bicycles to ensure the provision and availability of adequate cycle parking for each resident and the promotion of sustainable forms of transport. Additionally, due to the nature of the application, it is expected that a charging point for electric vehicles is included in the development to promote sustainable modes of transport. The DfT guidance regarding Electric Vehicle Charging in Residential and Non-residential buildings states charge points must have a minimum power rating output of 7kW and be fitted with a universal socket that can charge all types of electric vehicles.

Conditions

1. The development hereby permitted shall not be occupied or brought into use until the car parking and turning areas shown on the approved plan(s) have been provided in full and are available for use. The car parking and turning areas shall thereafter be kept available for the parking and manoeuvring of vehicles at all times.
Reason: To ensure the provision of adequate car parking on site and in the interests of highway safety.

2. No development shall take place, including any works of demolition or site clearance, until a Construction Management Plan (CMP) or Construction Method Statement (CMS) has been submitted to, and approved in writing by the local planning authority. The approved plan / statement shall provide:
 - 24 Hour emergency contact number.
 - Details of the parking of vehicles of site operatives and visitors.
 - Details of loading and unloading of plant and materials.
 - Arrangements for turning of vehicles within the site.
 - Measures to protect vulnerable road users (pedestrians and cyclists).
 - Wheel washing facilities.
 - Measures to control the emission of dust and dirt during construction.
 - Construction vehicle routing.
 - Delivery, demolition, and construction working hours.

The approved Construction Management Plan or Construction Method Statement shall be adhered to throughout the construction period for the development.

Reason: In the interests of the safe operation of the adopted highway during the demolition and construction phases.

3. Prior to first occupation cycle storage provisions for the residential unit shall be submitted to the Local Planning Authority, in consultation with the Local Highway Authority. These cycle facilities shall thereafter be kept free of obstruction and available for the parking of bicycles only at all times.

Reason: To promote sustainable transport as a travel option, encourage healthy communities and reduce carbon emissions.

Informative notes:

- There must be no reversing into or from the live highway at any time – all vehicles entering the site must do so in a forward gear, and turn around in the site before exiting in a forward gear onto the operational public highway.
- There must be no storage of materials in the public highway at any time.
- There must be no standing or waiting of machinery or vehicles in the public highway at any time.
- Vehicles must only access the site using a designated vehicular access point.
- There must be no machinery operating over the highway at any time, this includes reference to loading/unloading operations – all of which must be managed within the confines of the site.
- All references to public highway include footway, carriageway, and verge.
- The grant of planning permission does not entitle a developer to obstruct a right of way and any proposed stopping-up or diversion of a right of way should be the subject of an Order under the appropriate Act. The applicant should be advised to contact Lancashire County Council's Public Rights of Way section by email on PROW@lancashire.gov.uk, quoting the location, district and planning application number, to discuss their proposal before any development works begin.
