1 Background Information

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Planning permission (ref: 3/2022/0990) was granted in January 2023 for proposed residential development of a detached dwelling. This application is the same design as that which was previously approved.

This design statement has been prepared to support a planning application for the proposed residential development of a detached dwelling at Land on the North East side of Mulgrave House, Ribblesdale Avenue, Clitheroe.

The statement seeks to demonstrate that the proposal has undergone a formal and thoughtful design process and that the scheme proposed is a response to site context, access (into and within), massing, orientation and materiality. It also demonstrates consideration for the architectural detail that will be taken forward in order to create a high quality development; whilst highlighting a sustainable approach has been adopted.

1.2 AIM

This statement demonstrates that the proposed scheme has been informed by a rigorous process of assessment, evaluation and design and includes the following information:

- Use - what the building, and spaces it creates, will be used for;
- Scale - the extent of development;
- Layout - how the dwelling is to be arranged on the site and its relationship with its environs;
- Appearance - what the dwelling and proposed internal spaces will look like including building materials;
- Access - how the site is accessed and the accessibility of the dwelling within the context of the site.

1.3 APPLICATION

The planning application description is as follows:
'proposed residential development of a detached dwelling'.

1.4 THIS DOCUMENT

Referencing the national guidance - only applications for major development, development in designated areas and listed building consents must be accompanied by a design and access statement (DAS).

Whilst this application does not constitute any of the application types listed above, it is the general belief of the practice that these documents are a useful tool for outlining the design principles relevant to any application. They not only help to illustrate the design process undertaken but also the design can benefit through the thoughtful and rigorous approach required by a DAS.

With this in mind, a DAS is drafted to support most applications, including this application for the development of a detached dwelling.

The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) states that a DAS must: -

- a. *explain the design principles and concepts that have been applied to the proposed development; and*
- b. *demonstrate the steps taken to appraise the context of the proposed development, and how the design of the development takes that context into account.*

This DAS therefore explains how the proposed development is a suitable response to the site and its setting and demonstrates that it can be adequately accessed by prospective users.

It includes an appraisal of the site including an assessment of the immediate and wider surroundings in terms of physical, social and economic characteristics.

The DAS then goes on to state details relating to the proposed scheme including outlining the principles that have informed the design and the amount of development proposed.

1.5 DESIGN BRIEF

Stanton Andrews Architects were asked to review the existing site and consider options for a contemporary detached dwelling. The design should include a generous family room, lounge, utility, three first floor bedrooms, one with dressing and en suite and a generous family bathroom.

The brief requested the house be configured to suit modern family living with an open-plan arrangement to the kitchen/family room. The house should have a strong connection to the garden and wider setting. Natural light is to be encouraged.

1.6 STANTON ANDREWS ARCHITECTS

2 Site

2.1 LOCATION

The application site comprises a detached garden area on the western side of Ribblesdale Avenue.

2.2 SITE DESCRIPTION

The garden is long established with areas of lawn, shrubs and plants. The perimeter of the site is bound by post and panel fence to the north and south, railings to the west and low hedge and gate to the east meeting Ribblesdale Avenue. The site slopes gently from east to west.

The land generally slopes downwards from east to west. The houses on the east side of Ribblesdale Avenue appear to have been constructed in the early twentieth century and are substantial three storey properties, built with a majority of red brick with black slate roofs. The boundary to Ribblesdale Avenue is denoted by a low clipped hedge and iron gate. Mulgrave House adjacent to the site is two storeys built in brick and render with bands of coloured brickwork. The roof is concrete interlocking tiles and the front boundary wall is low in height and built in brick. It is similar in design to the modern houses to the west of the site on the Knuck Knowles estate. Ribblesdale Avenue serves a number of houses and is adopted across the front of the site. It also gives access to Moorlands School to the north.

The site is well connected by public transport, with various bus services operating along Waddington road 250m walk from the site. Clitheroe's rail interchange is also 650m from the site.

The site is not within an area identified by the Environment Agency's flood risk map as being subject to flooding.

3/2012/0488 Full planning application following on from the aforementioned 3/2011/0719. Development of two detached dwellings on land belonging to and adjacent to Radley, Ribblesdale Avenue. Granted 24/10/2012.

3/2019/0193 Outline planning consent. To erect a detached house on site with an access off Ribblesdale Avenue. Granted 17/04/2019.

3/2020/0898 Reserved matters for one two-storey dwelling following outline planning permission 3/2019/0193 including access, appearance, landscaping and scale. Resubmission of application 3/2020/0100. Granted 04/12/2020.

3/2021/0875 Full planning application. Proposed erection of a detached two and half storey dwelling with garden and driveway and new access. Granted 19/10/2021.

3/2021/1286 Full planning application. Proposed erection of a detached dwelling, detached garage, garden, landscaping works, new access and associated drive. Granted 09/02/2022.

3/2022/0762 Re-submission of planning application 3/2021/1286 with minor design amendments for the erection of a detached dwelling, detached garage, garden, landscaping works, new access and associated drive. Granted 20/09/2022.

4 The Design

4.1 DESIGN PROCESS

The current design proposal is the result of a detailed and thorough design process, in which a number of options were explored prior to deciding on and refining a preferred scheme.

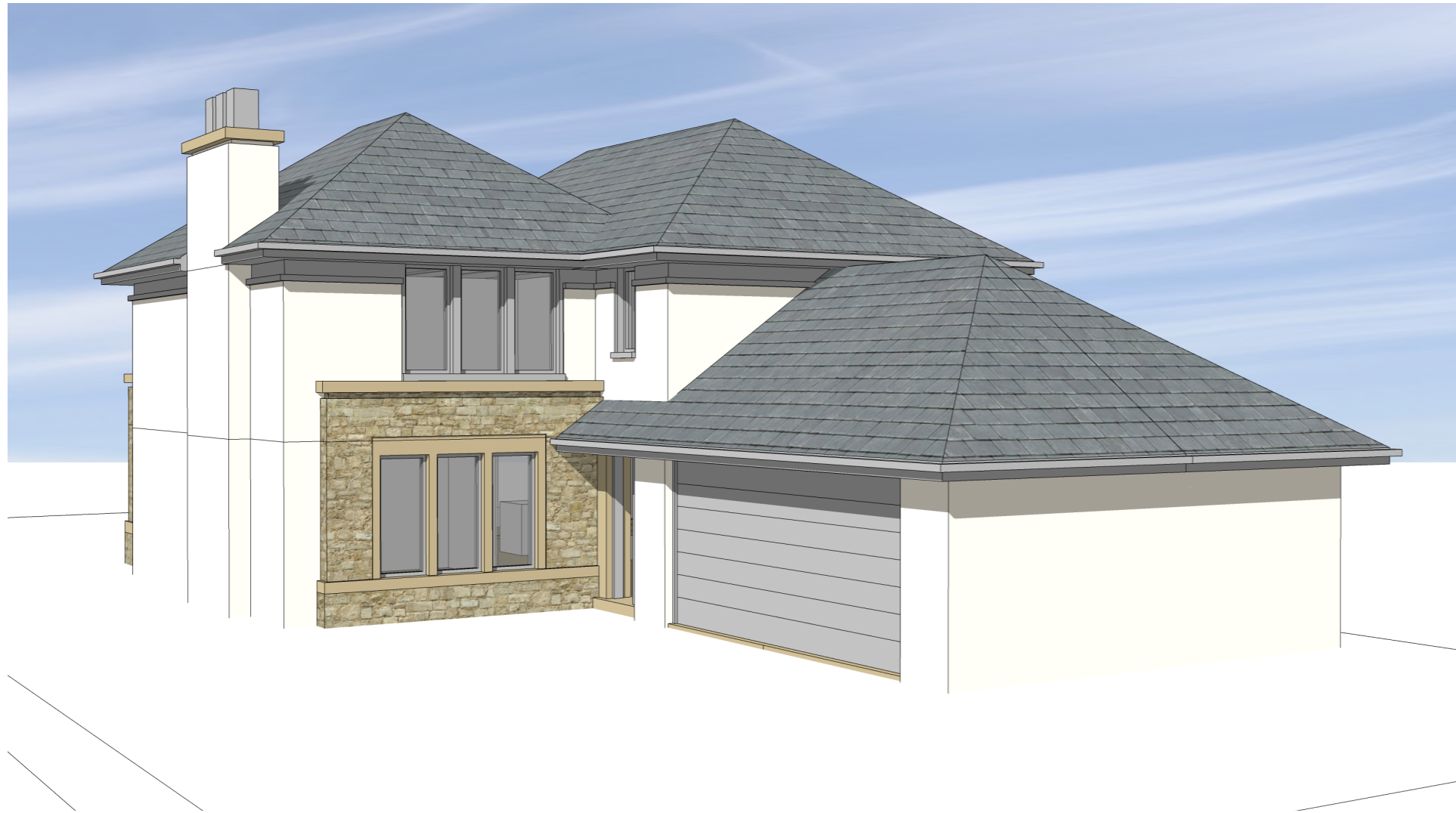
A number of early feasibility options were computer modelled within the context of the site. The use of detailed 3D modelling not only assists in visualising the schemes but also provides a detailed understanding of the massing of the proposals.

The process allowed the existing site and setting to be fully 'understood' ensuring that any proposals were well considered and integrated.

The resultant proposal for the dwelling has been designed to achieve the desired accommodation in response to the brief. It is believed the scheme provides contemporary, usable living accommodation with a strong connection and respect for its setting.

4.2 DESIGN CONCEPT

A robust architectural language is used with the proposal understood as a similar language to the neighbouring houses. Externally the house is faced in render with stone detailing and slated roof.



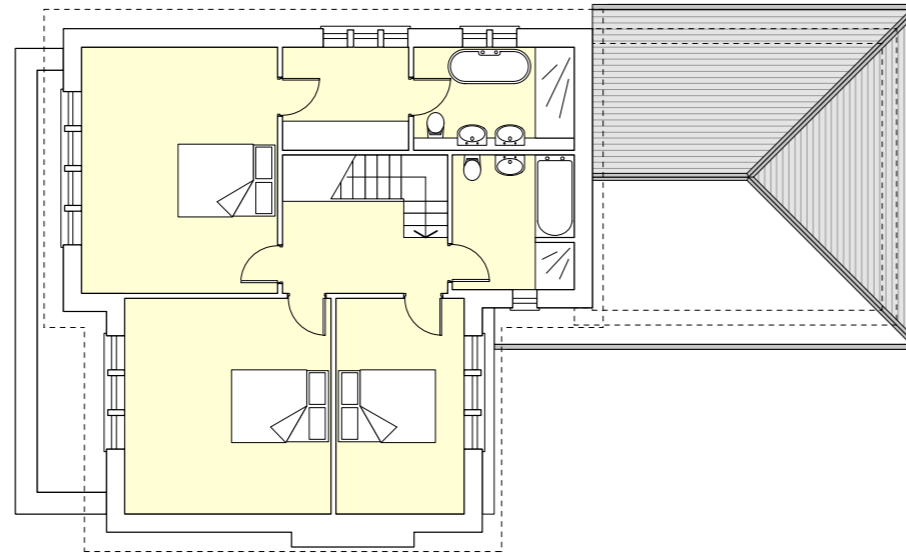
as proposed scheme



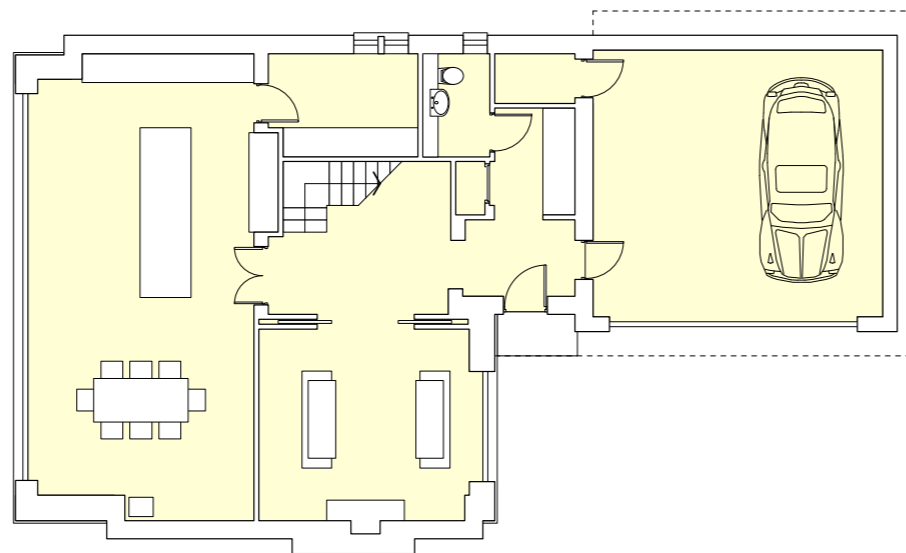
earlier development options

4.3 LAYOUT

The proposed dwelling is set up with the ground floor circulation providing a logical route through the plan. A large kitchen/family room sits to the west opening on to the garden. The entrance hall connects the living accommodation, the garage and the first floor. The ground floor accommodation has living accommodation orientated to the west aspect with a terrace opening to the garden. Service rooms are positioned to the north towards the site boundary and the rear of the garage. Three bedrooms are provided to the first floor, one with en suite and dressing room. The other bedrooms are served by a large family bathroom.

4.4 APPEARANCE

The house is faced in stone and render to be in-keeping with the neighbouring properties.

4.5 ACCESS/PARKING

The proposed access is off Ribblesdale Avenue. Sufficient parking is provided by the garage attached to the house and driveways to the east.

4.6 SCALE AND MASSING

The proposed dwelling is modest and reflects the massing of the surrounding development. In addition, the site is lower than the properties opposite on Ribblesdale Avenue meaning the proposed house will appear lower on the street scene.

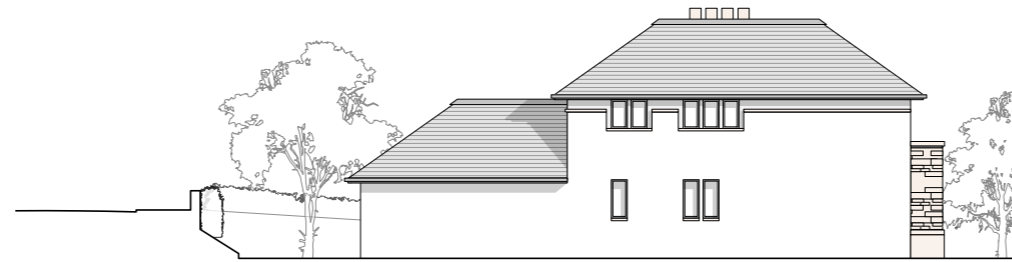

A breakdown of the dwelling's gross internal areas is provided below: -

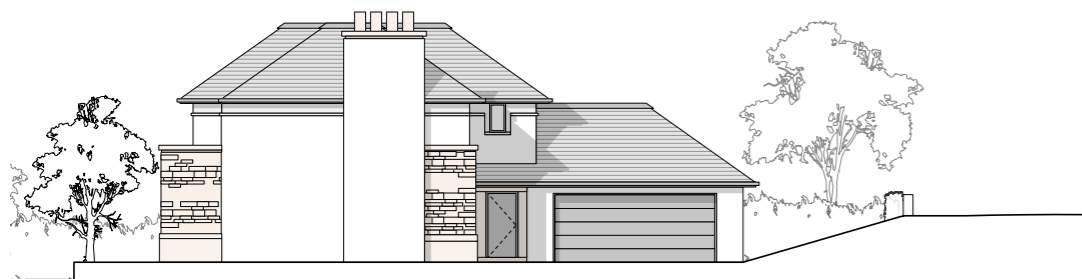
