DEVELOPMENT PROPOSED: Proposed extension to the garage to create a two-storey addition to the side of the house. Conversion of garage to living accommodation.

AT: 112 Clitheroe Road Whalley BB7 9AQ

Ribble Valley Borough Council hereby give notice that **permission has been granted** for the carrying out of the above development in accordance with the application plans and documents submitted subject to the following condition(s):

1. The development must be begun not later than the expiration of three years beginning with the date of this permission.

Reason: Required to be imposed by Section 51 of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004.

2. Unless explicitly required by condition within this consent, the development hereby permitted shall be carried out in complete accordance with the proposals as detailed on drawings:

Location Plan (1:1250)
Proposed Site Plan (dwg no. 2000)
Proposed Plans (dwg no. A1.2)
Proposed Elevation (dwg no. A2.1)
Proposed Visuals (dwg no. A0.3)

Reason: For the avoidance of doubt and to clarify which plans are relevant to the consent.

3. The materials to be used on the external surface of the development as indicated within the application form and on drawings 'Proposed Elevation' (dwg no. A2.1) and 'Proposed Visuals' (dwg no. A0.3) shall be implemented as indicated.

Reason: In order that the Local Planning Authority may ensure that the materials to be used are appropriate to the locality.

4. The first floor window in the eastern gable elevation of the extension hereby approved shall be fitted with obscure glazing (which shall have an obscurity rating of not less than 4 of the Pilkington glass obscurity rating or equivalent scale) and shall be non-opening, unless the parts of the window which can be opened are more than 1.7 metres above the floor of the room in which the window is installed.

Reason: To protect nearby/ neighbouring and future residential amenity.

5. The development hereby permitted shall not be first occupied until such time as the parking facilities shown on the approved 'Proposed Site Plan' (dwg no. 2000) have been implemented in full. The parking area shall be constructed of a bound porous material and thereafter retained as such in perpetuity.

Reason: To ensure that adequate off-street parking provision is made to reduce the possibility of the proposed development leading to on-street parking problems locally.

6. The development hereby permitted shall be carried out in strict accordance with the Precautionary Method Statement and Reasonable Avoidance Measures - Bats detailed within the submitted Preliminary Bat Roost Assessment Report dated 8th December 2025 and carried out by Dave Anderson.

Reason: In the interest of biodiversity and to enhance roosting opportunities for species of conservation concern and reduce the impact of development.

1. For rights of appeal in respect of any condition(s)/or reason(s) attached to the permission see the attached notes.
2. The applicant is advised that should there be any deviation from the approved plan the Local Planning Authority must be informed. It is therefore vital that any future Building Regulation application must comply with the approved planning application.
3. The Local Planning Authority has endeavoured to work proactively and positively to resolve issues and considered the imposition of appropriate conditions and amendments to the application to deliver a sustainable form of development.

Notes

If you are aggrieved by the decision of your local planning authority to refuse permission for the proposed development or to grant it subject to conditions, then you can appeal to the Secretary of State under section 78 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.

If you want to appeal against your local planning authority's decision, then you must do so within 6 months of the date of this notice unless the following apply:

- If this is a decision to refuse planning permission for a householder application or a minor commercial application, if you want to appeal against your local planning authority's decision then you must do so within 12 weeks of the date of this notice.
- If this is a decision on a planning application relating to the same or substantially the same land and development as is already the subject of an enforcement notice [reference], if you want to appeal against your local planning authority's decision on your application, then you must do so within 28 days of the date of this notice.
- If an enforcement notice is served relating to the same or substantially the same land and development as in your application and if you want to appeal against your local planning authority's decision on your application, then you must do so within: 28 days of the date of service of the enforcement notice, or within 6 months [12 weeks in the case of a householder appeal] of the date of this notice, whichever period expires earlier.

The Secretary of State can allow a longer period for giving notice of an appeal but will not normally be prepared to use this power unless there are special circumstances which excuse the delay in giving notice of appeal.

The Secretary of State need not consider an appeal if it seems to the Secretary of State that the local planning authority could not have granted planning permission for the proposed development or could not have granted it without the conditions they imposed, having regard to the statutory requirements, to the provisions of any development order and to any directions given under a development order.
