Ribble Valley Borough Council hereby give notice that **permission has been granted** for the carrying out of the above development in accordance with the application plans and documents submitted subject to the following condition(s):

1. Unless explicitly required by condition within this consent, the development hereby permitted shall be carried out in complete accordance with the proposals as detailed on drawings: -

- Location Plan 1:250 @ A4 01-May-2026
- Site Plan 1:100 @ A4
- Elevations Drawing No: 01
- Proposed Ridge Beam Replacement - Listed Building Consent Supporting Sketch Drawing No: BCG-2026-109-SK01

Reason: For the avoidance of doubt and to clarify which plans are relevant to the consent.

2. The materials to be used in the development hereby approved shall be implemented as indicated on Proposed Ridge Beam Replacement - Listed Building Consent Supporting Sketch Drawing No: BCG-2026-109-SK01.

Reason: In order that the Local Planning Authority may ensure that the detailed design of the proposal safeguards the special architectural and historic interest of the Listed Building and to ensure that the detailed design of the proposal responds positively to the inherent character of the area.

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3. The development hereby approved shall be carried out in accordance with the works detailed / recommended within pages 6 - 7 (Section 7: Proposed Structural Repair Works & Section 8: Temporary Works and Installation Methodology) of the structural survey submitted as part of the application titled "Structural Design Technical Note - 57 Downham Rd, BB7 4AU" dated 20/05/2026 and carried out by Building Calcs Guys. Any deviation from the survey and approved plans may need to be the subject of a further listed building consent application.

Reason: To prevent inappropriate works which exceed the scope of works hereby approved.

4. Notwithstanding otherwise agreed in writing with the Local Planning Authority, the development hereby approved shall be carried out in complete accordance with the recommendations detailed on pages 6 and 7 of the submitted Ecological Appraisal titled "Proposed roof replacement work at 57 Downham Road, Chatburn, BB7 4AU" dated 6th April 2026 and carried out by Ecology Services UK Limited.

Reason: To protect the bat population from potentially damaging activities and to reduce remove the impact of development on any bats.

1. For rights of appeal in respect of any condition(s)/or reason(s) attached to the permission see the attached notes.
2. The applicant is advised that should there be any deviation from the approved plan the Local Planning Authority must be informed. It is therefore vital that any future Building Regulation application must comply with the approved planning application.
3. The Local Planning Authority has endeavoured to work proactively and positively to resolve issues and considered the imposition of appropriate conditions and amendments to the application to deliver a sustainable form of development.

Notes

If you are aggrieved by the decision of your local planning authority to refuse permission for the proposed development or to grant it subject to conditions, then you can appeal to the Secretary of State under section 78 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.

If you want to appeal against your local planning authority's decision, then you must do so within 6 months of the date of this notice unless the following apply:

- If this is a decision to refuse planning permission for a householder application or a minor commercial application, if you want to appeal against your local planning authority's decision then you must do so within 12 weeks of the date of this notice.

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- If this is a decision on a planning application relating to the same or substantially the same land and development as is already the subject of an enforcement notice [reference], if you want to appeal against your local planning authority's decision on your application, then you must do so within 28 days of the date of this notice.
- If an enforcement notice is served relating to the same or substantially the same land and development as in your application and if you want to appeal against your local planning authority's decision on your application, then you must do so within: 28 days of the date of service of the enforcement notice, or within 6 months [12 weeks in the case of a householder appeal] of the date of this notice, whichever period expires earlier.

If someone does not have access to the internet and needs help completing the appeal digitally, they should contact the Planning Inspectorate customer service team on 0303 444 5000 who will provide details of support options available.

The Secretary of State can allow a longer period for giving notice of an appeal but will not normally be prepared to use this power unless there are special circumstances which excuse the delay in giving notice of appeal.

The Secretary of State need not consider an appeal if it seems to the Secretary of State that the local planning authority could not have granted planning permission for the proposed development or could not have granted it without the conditions they imposed, having regard to the statutory requirements, to the provisions of any development order and to any directions given under a development order.
