We wish to comment on the planning application 3/2026/0467. The planned proposals will directly affect us [REDACTED].

We would like to object to this planning application on grounds of loss of privacy. The planned project would add an extra extension to Shire Croft upper floor at the back of the house. This is [REDACTED] house.

This would then mean that all of the [REDACTED]

Currently, only [REDACTED] so not intrusive. The plans suggest that this would become a long line of five windows altogether [REDACTED].

This would be a big change and a large scale project and would affect our use of our property and the current secluded aspect would be lost.

Unfortunately, all of the [REDACTED]

[REDACTED]. The new plans would undermine privacy and in winter, when trees are not in leaf, cause considerable overlooking and a suburban aspect. Currently, with the trees in leaf, this is not as obvious.

Five upstairs windows plus numerous downstairs windows, as the Shire Croft plan suggests, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] could potentially all be lit up in winter. This would cause the dark sky aspect to be lost at a time when preserving nature is so important; changing the character of [REDACTED], which is a country cottage, and affecting our enjoyment of amenity. In summertime, if these new windows are open, there will be added noise from them.

The building upheaval itself will be, presumably, a long-term project, causing disruption in noise levels and to nature, not to mention traffic.

If the plan has to go ahead, it would be positive if landscaping could be looked at or the window design (maybe obscure windows at points?).

Whilst we understand the applicant's wish to extend, we feel the impact on [REDACTED] would be detrimental, especially in winter when the affect of a long line of, potentially all lit up, windows [REDACTED] will be evident and have an intrusive impact, changing the character of our home.

Whilst reluctant to comment, we feel that we have to give our perspective as we are the property that will be affected by this change.
